COSTUMING IDEAS FROM PUBLIC LIBRARY DATABASES By Lady Lidia Lijovich de Ragusa

The Daily Life Through History series of reference books is a popular resource for general historical research, typically available at public libraries. Recently, an **online** version of the Daily Life In books has been made available to the local populace through NC Live. Many North Carolina public libraries, including the Gaston Lincoln Regional Library in Aire Faucon provide **remote access** to these NC Live databases to library cardholders, as well as to the general public at any of their locations.

The Daily Life books cover a broad range of historical cultures including Ancient Mesopotamia, Ancient Greeks, Aztecs, Incas, Mayans, Chaucer's England, Elizabethan, Civil War, Frontier, and Victorian. Daily Life in **Chaucer's England** and Daily Life in **Elizabethan England** are two "books" in this database collection that may be of particular interest to SCA dians.

Besides general historical background information, each of these books has topics that include the Course of Life, Cycles of Time, the Living Environment, and Food and Drink. Both have very interesting chapters on Clothing and Accessories/Accoutrements that include period patterns.

For instance, Chaucer's England includes patterns for breechs, a shirt, hose, a kirtle, men's and women's headgear, shoes, and a pouch. Directions for making medieval lace are also given. (The technique shown looks possibly like finger-loop braiding.) Either click on the "Clothing and Accessories" subheading, and browse



each page using the Next button in the lower lefthand corner of the screen or run a keyword search on the term "pattern" (singular).

In Elizabethan England provides many detailed illustrations of period outfits and well as patterns for a smock, bodice, skirt, roll, breeches, shirt, Venetian breeches, doublet, coif, flap cap, netherstocks, garters, shoes, and a cassock. Once again, either click on the "Clothing and Accessories" subheading and browse each page using the Next button in the lower left-hand corner of the screen, or run a keyword search on the term "pattern".

Remember that the Daily Life Through History resources are available in the NC Live collection of databases through North Carolina public libraries. If you hold a Gaston Regional Public Library card, you can obtain a NC LIVE @ HOME password from the Circulation desk at the Main Library or at any of Branch Libraries in Gaston or Lincoln counties. The passwords do expire, need to be obtained twice a year, and must be signed for and obtained in person.

PERSONA STORY Lady Ceara ni Neill

Ceara ni Neill is a 29-year old 9th century Irish woman, descended of the great King Niall of the Nine Hostages (ruler of Ireland until his death in 540 c.e.).

It was this lineage, the <u>Clan McNeill</u>, that would settle the <u>Isle of Barra</u> at the western coast of lower Scotland in the 11th century to build the first <u>Kisimul Castle</u>.

Before coming to Meridies and Atlantia nine years ago, Ceara's home was a small castle overlooking the seashore in Meath, about 2 days travel north of Tara*. Her mother having died at childbirth, her father raised Ceara until his untimely death at the hands of Saxon bandits on the road near Clonmacnois ten years ago. Ceara did have a motherly influence, though. There was a baintreach that lived on the castle grounds, who had secretly taught her the Old Ways.

A bard, minstrel and artisan, Ceara is also a member, albeit inactive, of <u>Clanne Preachain</u>, another household dedicated to recreating the lifestyles of early Celtic culture.

She currently maintains <u>PastTimes on the Web</u>, an online newsletter dedicated to the advancement of arts and sciences in the SCA.

Directions:

Take your best route to I-64.

From the East: Take I-64 to Exit 242A. This is Route 199 West. Staying in the right lane, proceed to the 4th traffic light (about 6 miles), turn right onto Route 5 East (Jamestown Road). ***

From the West: Take I-64 east to exit 234. Turn right onto route 199 East. Proceed to the 2nd traffic light (about 7-8 miles). Turn left onto Route 5 East (Jamestown Road).***

***Go through one light and proceed until the road narrows to one lane. Stay in the left lane only before this time. After you pass the lake there will be a left turn onto Campus Drive. Park either in the unpaved lot on the left or the paved lot on the right.
